The Critical Indigenous Photographic Exchange: PASEO

Using an old fashioned, large format camera and the historic wet plate collodion process the artist will invite a select group of indigenous artists and arts professionals, as well as the general public, to engage in the ritual interchange that is the photographic studio portrait. The particular beauty of this old photographic process references a bygone era and the historic images that continue to contribute to societies collective understanding of Native American people. Wilson's project sparks an intervention into this history of photography revealing the multidimensional nature of photography and the multiplicity of meanings and possibilities that photographs can generate.

BIO: William (Will) Wilson is a Diné photographer who spent his formative years living in the Navajo Nation. Born in San Francisco in 1969, Wilson studied photography at The University of New Mexico (MFA, writing a dissertation on the photography of Milton S. Snow), and at Oberlin College. He is currently a an adjunct professor of art at the Institute of American Indian Arts in Santa Fe, NM and will have a one man exhibition of his work at the Wheelwright Museum next Spring.

Debbie Long is a visual artist whose works engage the physical phenomena of light, color, and space. Interested in how these phenomena communicate outside the language of words, Long's works are often built for the slow read, and invite the physical presence of the viewer over time. The Naima Trailer is a chamber of purple light and glass hidden inside a rusted trailer, large enough for 2 people to sit inside. Hundreds of handmade glass objects collect light from the sky. The interior transforms as light shifts throughout the day, sunrise to sunset. Long has exhibited her work at Mark Moore Gallery in Los Angeles, CA; High Desert Test Sites in Joshua Tree, CA; Gallery 128 Lower East Side in New York City, NY; Cinemaland Chinatown in Los Angeles, CA; and Boston University in Boston, MA. Long received Pilchuck Glass Residency and Creative Capital workshop grants. In 2014 Long's work was reviewed in Artillery Magazine, Los Angeles, CA; ArtSlant, Santa Fe, NM; and included in Art Studio America, a book about US Artists in their studios. Before establishing her current studio in Taos in 2000, Long split her time between Taos and Los Angeles.

STATEMENT: A site-specific improvisational projection art performance. Austrian artist Maki gives an aesthetic interpretation of the nanoscopic universe of quantum physics, where conventional deterministic thinking is challenged by notions such as duality, the uncertainty principle and parallel existence of many worlds. The aim is to augment reality and capture the imaginations of unsuspecting passersby by creating animated paintings live on an architectural canvas. A certain cat by Maki's compatriot Erwin Schrödinger is highly likely to make an appearance.

IMPLEMENTATION: The artwork will be created and animated live at two tablet computers mounted on microphone stands. A third iPad receives the visuals in realtime over Wi-Fi and outputs the artwork to a projector, which illuminates the targeted architectural structure. A sound system provides ambient music provided by Markus. The artists are visible to the audience and can incorporate reactions and interactions into the performance.

PERSONAL BIO: Markus Dorninger aka. Maki acts on the forefront of a new wave of digital art. His work comprises projection interventions in public space, as well as performances at cultural or commercial events. He often collaborates with musicians, and much of his output is based on improvisation and freestyle storytelling. He's a co-founder of Austrian arts production company OMAi, and the inventor and designer of Tagtool, the award-winning instrument for spontaneous visual expression.

ALYCE SANTORO & JULIAN MOCK, PROIECTS FOR PREPARED EAR

TITLE: RYTHMANALYSIS: THE SONIC FABRIC OF TAOS Listening station for a site-specific sound installation composed of samples collected by the Taos community during a field recording expedition. The site will be marked by a string of Sonic Fabric flags (woven from cassette tape).

PROJECT DESCRIPTION: During the week prior to the opening of Paseo, Conceptual artist Alyce Santoro and composer Julian Mock will engage the public in collecting audio samples from the Taos soundscape. Working with the samples, the duo will create an intricately layered collage of found sounds to be presented in a live performance combined with improvisation for electrified flute and guitar. In addition, Santoro will install a site-specific string of flags made of fabric woven from recorded cassette tape in a location along the Paseo. Santoro and Mock have produced similar sound art workshops/installations in Santiago de Compostela, Spain, NYC, and in Albuquerque, NM during ISEA2012.

INSTALLATION-IMPLEMENTATION-DESIGN: Several days prior to the Paseo opening, Julian and I will come to Taos to produce sound-sample-collecting workshops with the public (we have 8 recording devices available for public use - for larger groups, teams of up to three individuals per recorder can be formed). Together we will analyze the samples and incorporate them into an original musical composition to be performed along with live improvisation during the Paseo festivities. The string of sonic fabric flags can be custom-designed to suit a particular outdoor location along the Paseo route. The size and number of individual flags as well as the overall length of the string can be adjusted according to the space available.

BIO: Alyce Santoro is an interdisciplinary conceptual and sound artist whose work is deeply informed by science and philosophy. Drawing on a background in biology and scientific illustration, she creates "Philosoprops" (or "Props for Installation and Diatribe") using video, assemblage, text, and live performance to draw parallels between seemingly disparate fields and to spark dialog about holistic approaches to challenges facing the environment and society. Julian Mock is a composer and guitarist who explores the effects of sound on perception of time and space. He has produced two albums of innovative compositions for solo steel- and nylon-stringed guitar. Collaboratively the pair produced "Between Stations", an album of sound collages composed of samples collected on and under the streets of New York City. In 2011 they were commissioned to create a sound collage and special edition of Santoro's "sonic fabric" - a textile woven from recorded audio cassette tape – in the Galician region of northwestern Spain.

STATEMENT: I propose an overhead projection related in technique to the accompanying images and video. I would introduce imagery related to the Taos area (like the images in the Strait video, which were shot in the Hondo Mesa and near the John Dunn Bridge) but would make them generative rather than prerecorded, as in the Rounds piece I recently completed. The work would encourage physical, movement based exploration, perceptual play, and a sense of wonder and revelation.

INSTALLATION / IMPLEMENTATION: I would require a space where the image can be projected onto a fairly smooth, uniform, and light colored surface such as concrete, where ambient light is not too strong and where viewers are free to wander over the projection, looking at the images on the ground and in the reflections. The stainless steel reflectors would need to be able to be scattered around the projected area.

Agnes Chavez is an interdisciplinary Taos-based artist inspired by particle physics, nature and technology. In her latest series, (x)trees, she collaborates with programmers to create algorithmic drawings generated from data and projected in real time on to buildings/walls.

For the Lighting of Ledoux in 2009, she presented (x)trees, an interactive projection of tree forms generated from real-time text, twitter and archived data. The audience participates by texting to create a branch. In 2012 she was invited to bring the (x)trees to the Albuquerque Museum for ISEA2012 and collaborated with Alessandro Saccoia, who created the (x)tree code written in OpenFrameworks.

For The Paseo, Chavez collaborates with Kamen Dimitrov, to push the code further and present a new series of the (x)trees.

Kamen Dimitrov is a creative coder from Sofia Bulgaria who experiments at the intersection of technology, art and design. he loves playing around with code and creating interactive experiences. See (x)tree fact sheet for more details.

ARTIST STATEMENT AND PROPOSAL: During the time I lived in Taos, I made over 150 GB (~250 hours) of field recordings. Many of these recordings are of natural environments. For this sound installation, I like to imagine Taos before people, before it was Taos. That is, I would like to create an abstract musical piece utilizing the natural recordings as the central compositional elements. As I imagine it, the final composition would affect an atmospheric and light aesthetic, or what I imagine as the spirit of what draws people, artists, and like-minded folks to Taos. The running length would be roughly 2 hours. STATEMENT: Rain is an interactive installation involving your smartphone and a large-scale LED array. Visitors text 'rain' to a cell phone number to receive a series of questions about energy. If a user guesses the right answer, the user receives a success message and the LED array displays an animation in response, if they guess wrong a different animation is displayed depending on how close the answer was to the correct answer, and the user gets a text notification and another chance to try. After 3 tries, the user is texted the right answer and receives the next question. Rain was designed and created by the UNM Social Media Workgroup (SMW) directed by Andrea Polli as part of the Sustainable Energy Pathways in Engineering and Technology (SEPTET) project, PI Olga Lavrova.

BIOGRAPHY: Principal artist Andrea Polli is an artist and scholar working at the intersection of art, science and technology whose practice includes public media performance and installation, interventions, curating, directing and writing. She is an Associate Professor in Art & Ecology with a joint appointment between Fine Arts and Engineering, holds the Mesa Del Sol Endowed Chair of Digital Media, and is the Director of the Social Media Workgroup at The University of New Mexico. She earned a doctorate in practice-led art from the University of Plymouth in the UK and a Master of Fine Arts in Time Arts from the School of the Art Institute of Chicago. Polli has been creating media and technology artworks related to environmental science issues since 1999, when she first began collaborating with atmospheric scientists on sound and data sonification projects. Among other organizations, she has worked with the NASA/Goddard Institute Climate Research Group and the National Center for Atmospheric Research and her artwork and research has been funded by The National Endowment for the Arts (NEA), The National Science Foundation (NSF) and Fulbright including two over \$1.5 million projects: the NEA-supported ISEA2012: Machine Wilderness throughout New Mexico and the Southwest and the 5-year NSFfunded SEPTET project.

BIO: Sasha was born in Taos, New Mexico and has been exhibiting his work since 1992. His paintings hang in collections in Asia, Europe and the United States. For the past 11 years he's been developing ways to see and document sound. These studies moved him to work with light and other mediums. He currently works in two studios, Los Angeles, CA, and Taos, New Mexico.

STATEMENT: I've made these photographs to better know my place in the universe. Our ability to travel the cosmos being limited, I've built a machine in an attempt to observe elemental transactions. I've created a mechanical solution to what is a metaphysical problem, forcing basic elements of perception - sound, light, and matter - into a single frame. These are photographs of sound encountering light as seen through the medium of water. On one hand, I've staged common phenomena and on the other hand I've captured tiny cataclysms never to be repeated. I bring you evidence of a minute history, in which no instance is petty and every instant too complex to perceive in its entirety. A moment is all time, an atom the universe. These photographs aim to capture the beauty and turmoil that occurs inside the most pedestrian events. Sunlight bounces on water, sound waves march toward oblivion.

TECHNICAL DETAILS: The Sound Illuminator is constructed out of the repurposed nose cowling of a Boeing 727 jet airplane. The interior speaker vibrates and moves a larger acrylic water filled cone. Either natural sunlight, or tone sensitive LED lights (with something of an equivalent to light in terms of vibration) surround the basin, reacting to the stimuli in the water. Sound, water and light are temporarily corralled in the same small space, their interactions, and endless permutations can be captured by means of video and photography, or be observed by participants.

ABOUT THE INSTALLATION: For this Showing, the Illuminator is running on a feedback loop. Participants can add an input into the feedback loop of the machine with either light, sound, or both combined. The sounds are translated into light. The light is then translated back into sound where it can be seen in the palette of the Illuminator. Observers can gather around and place their hands on the machine to feel the vibrations emanating from it. Thus, a fusion of the visual, the tactile and the auditory senses is achieved wherein the observers are active participants.

BIO: Yulia Pinkusevich is an interdisciplinary visual artist. Born in 1982 in Kharkov, Ukraine. She holds a Masters of Fine Arts from at Stanford University and Bachelors of Fine Arts from Rutgers University, Mason Gross School of the Arts, graduating both universities with highest honors. Yulia has exhibited locally and internationally including site-specific projects executed in Paris, France and Buenos Aires, Argentina. She has been awarded residency grants from Recology (SF Dump), Cite des Arts International in Paris, Headlands Center for the Arts in Marin, Redux in Charleston, SC, Goldwell Open Air Museum, Las Vegas, NV and The Wurlitzer Foundation Taos, NM. She was also the recipient of The San Francisco Foundations 2011 Phelan, Murphy & Cadogan Fellowship in the Fine Arts as well as Stanford University SiCA's Spark and ASSU Grants. Yulia's work has been widely written about in various print publications, including The Miami Herald, Sacramento Bee, Kansas City Star, The Columbian (Vancouver), Oman Tribune and the Gulf Times (Quatar). Other international magazines include Dwell and Adbusters. Prominent online media includes KQED, Rhizome and Square Cylinder. Yulia is Assistant Professor of art at Mills College, she lives and works in Oakland California.

UNDER PROGRESS STATEMENT: Under progress was created while Yulia was an Artist in residence at Recology the San Francisco dump. She scavenged over 60 computers, monitors, audio amplifiers, etc. Taking each machine painstakingly apart in the reverse order in was assembled. Yulia pulled out the circuit boards and saved all the heat sinks inside. Using these components to construct a projection box that contains objects that cast images on architecture around us. The results are visually complex cityscapes—large darkened outlines of high-rises and other familiar urban forms. While it is obvious this is a city, exactly what city this might be is less clear, as the architecture seems a cross between the futuristic and the familiar. An important part of Yulia Pinkusevich's practice involves the creation of large-scale monochromic paintings and drawings, often made directly on walls that engage with architecture and play with spatial perception. With "Under Progress" she has continued this practice, but has instead "drawn" with the duality of light and shadow. Pinkusevich examines the role of architecture in our daily lives and how it frames, transects, and obscures the world around us, affecting our spatial perception and cognitive understanding. Her work also addresses broader issues related to global urbanization and labor. The fabrication of electronics and other consumer goods increasingly has societal and environmental consequences when formerly rural areas become sites of rapidly built factories and worker housing. The long-term impact this instant architecture will have is only beginning to be understood.

Christina Sporrong is a performance artist and metal sculptor. She abandoned city life to live in the inspiring high mountain desert, where she established Spitfire Forge, her own commercial blacksmithing and fabrication shop. She has choreographed several pieces including "Amortec", a dance between a woman on stilts and a robot. The sculptural and performative process intersect on many levels for Sporrong, as is witnessed through The Heron Project, a large scale kinetic sculpture that acts as a performance playground. She was awarded a Burning Man Grant to build a fiery interactive musical sculpture, Caged Pulse Jets, combining spinning jet engines, fire and sound for the public to play as an instrument.

TECHNICAL: Caged Pulse Jets is an interactive, kinetic sound sculpture. The caged birds are five spinning pulse jet engines of various sizes that create a range of percussive and droning tones. Through a completely interactive interface, the public can create sound compositions ranging from the symphonic to the cacophonous while they are held captive by the fiery jets spinning by their own thrust. The public can enjoy playing these jet engines in an explosive cacophonous symphony while watching them spin around and expel fire. Caged Pulse Jets is a highly entertaining sound sculpture that is fun to play and watch for kids and adults alike.

ARTIST STATEMENT: The Matter of Memory is a work investigating the relationship between memory and place. Users running this application can create an audio recording tied to a specific location. When the user is about to record, they are presented with the question, "Why is this place important to you?" Once the recording is submitted, users must be within 100 feet of the recording's origin to be able to listen to it. By requiring listeners to be within a certain radius of the origin of the recording, this imposes questions of how memories are created and affected by time and space.
